South Florida - 2019 CBI Champions

In 2019, 11 games were decided by less than 10 points, with an average margin of victory of 9.4 ppg. Over the last five CBIs, 58 games have been decided by 10 points or less.

CBI POSTSEASON SUCCESS: Since 2008, 28 teams that participated in the CBI went on to play in the NCAA Tournament the following season. In addition, another 20 teams went on to play in the NIT the following season.

DID YOU KNOW...

Ten of the 12 CBI Finals have gone the distance as Tulsa (2008), Oregon State (2009), Oregon (2011), Pittsburgh (2012), Santa Clara (2013), Siena (2014), Nevada (2016), Wyoming (2017), North Texas (2018), and South Florida (2019) won in three games. In 2010, VCU became the first team to need two games to win the CBI crown. Loyola Chicago also accomplished that feat in 2015.

THAT'S A FACT

In the previous 12 CBI Finals, the team that won the first game of the Finals Series went on to win the series seven times. The five times the Game 1 winner lost the series were in 2011, 2012, 2016, 2017, and 2018 when Creighton opened with a victory against Oregon (2011), Washington State beat Pittsburgh in its opener (2012), Morehead State downed Nevada in the 2016 opener, Coastal Carolina defeated Wyoming (2017), and San Francisco beat North Texas (2018)

Samples of CBI Success

- After winning the 2018 CBI championship, North Texas recorded consecutive 20-win seasons and won the 2020 C-USA regular season title and earned a bid to the 2021 NCAA Tournament.
- After winning the 2016 CBI in head coach Eric Musselman's first season, Nevada won a school record 14 Mountain West Conference games en route to the regular season and tournament championships and a berth in the NCAA Tournament in 2017, a national ranking and NCAA Sweet 16 berth in 2018, and a Top 10 ranking in 2019.
- Vermont reached the semifinals of the 2016 CBI and then posted a 16-0 record in America East Conference play and won the 2017 American East regular season and tournament titles.
- In 2016, UNCG earned its first postseason berth since 2001 and followed that by winning the 2017 Southern Conference regular season crown and the SoCon regular season and tournament titles in 2018.
- **Loyola Chicago's two freshmen from its 2015 CBI title team led the Ramblers to the Missouri Valley regular season and tournament titles as seniors in 2018, one earning MVP honors (Donte Ingram) and the other being named to the all-tournament team (Ben Richardson). Loyola then advanced to the NCAA Final Four.**
- Texas A&M returned seven players from the 2014 CBI, advanced to the 2015 NIT and were ranked as high as fifth during the 2015-16 season.
- Stony Brook played in the 2014 and 2015 CBI and then earned its first NCAA bid in 2016, while Colorado also played in the 2015 CBI and received a 2016 NCAA bid.
- Wyoming went 25-9 and won the Mountain West championship to earn its first NCAA bid since 2002, Hampton won the MEAC title for the first time since 2011, and South Dakota State won the Summit League's regular season crown all after participating in the 2014 CBI.
- North Dakota State and Western Michigan both won their respective league regular season and tournament championships and Tulsa won its postseason tournament after playing in the 2013 CBI.
- Texas followed its 2013 CBI berth into a No. 7 seed in the 2014 NCAA Tournament. The Longhorns were ranked as high as No. 15 in 2014.
- Pittsburgh won the 2012 CBI and earned a No. 8 seed in the 2013 NCAA Tournament.
- After advancing to consecutive NCAA championship games, Butler played in the 2012 CBI, advancing to the semifinals. They followed that with a No. 6 seed in the 2013 NCAA Tournament.
- In 2012, Creighton, Davidson, Montana, and St. Bonaventure all won their respective league tournaments after playing in the 2011 CBI.
- **VCU won the 2010 CBI and advanced to the Final Four the next season.**
- Creighton advanced to the Championship Series of the 2011 CBI and in 2012 was ranked as high as 13th.
- Oregon won the 2011 CBI and went 24-10 the following season, surpassing the previous season's win total, which included five CBI wins.
- Morehead State played in the 2010 CBI and the next year had, arguably, the greatest season in school history.
- Saint Louis advanced to the final of the 2010 CBI with a team featuring seven freshmen. Those freshmen headlined the 2013 Atlantic 10 regular season and tournament championships, earning a No. 4 seed in the 2013 NCAA Tournament.
- Richmond advanced to the semifinals of the 2009 CBI and went on to earn back-to-back NCAA Tournament bids for the first time in 19 years.

- UTEP reached the Championship Series of the 2009 CBI and went on to advance to the 2010 NCAA Tournament and win 51 games the next two seasons.
- Tulsa won the 2008 CBI prior to winning 48 games the next two years.
- Utah played in the 2008 CBI and went on to win 24 games the next season and reach the NCAA Tournament for the first time in four years.

It Happened in the CBI

- On April 1, 2019, South Florida won its school record 23rd game when the Bulls downed DePaul, 63-61 in Game 1 of the Finals.
- California Baptist and Longwood made their first-ever Division I postseason appearances in the 2019 CBI, with Longwood winning its initial game.
- Central Arkansas won its first-ever Division I postseason games in the First Round of the 2018 CBI.
- Wyoming's 2017 CBI championship was its first national title since 1943.
- Both UMKC and Utah Valley won their first-ever Division I postseason games in the First Round of the 2017 CBI.
- By winning the 2016 CBI, Nevada earned the first-ever postseason basketball title in Mountain West Conference history.
- Loyola Chicago's 2015 CBI bid marked the Ramblers' first postseason appearance since advancing to the Sweet 16 of the 1985 NCAA Tournament. Seattle's berth was its first Division I postseason bid since 1969.
- Siena earned its first-ever postseason championship in winning the 2014 CBI. The Saints moved to Division I in 1976-77.
- By advancing to the Championship Series of the 2014 CBI, Fresno State reached the championship of a postseason tournament for just the second time in school history (1983).
- Bryant made its first-ever postseason appearance when it hosted Richmond in the First Round of the 2013 CBI.
- In back-to-back games in the 2012 CBI, Oregon State posted the two highest field goal percentages in CBI history. In the First Round against Western Illinois, the Beavers set the record by shooting 30-46 (.652) from the field. The next game against TCU in the Quarterfinals, OSU shot 39-60 (.650) from the field - the second-best effort in tournament history.
- On March 14, 2012, Western Illinois played in its first-ever postseason game.
- On March 16, 2011, UCF beat St. Bonaventure, 69-54, for the school's first-ever postseason win. UCF would go on to advance to the semifinals of the CBI.
- On March 16, 2011, Rhode Island beat Miami (Ohio), 76-59, in the First Round of the CBI. The win was the 90th for the Rams' senior class of Marquis Jones, Will Martell, Delroy James, and Ben Eaves, tying them as the winningest four-year class in school history.
- On March 16, 2011, Rhode Island's Delroy James posted the first triple-double in school history with his 22-point, 11-rebound, and 10-assist effort in a 76-59 win over Miami (Ohio).
- On March 15, 2011, Hofstra's Charles Jenkins scored his 2,500th career point in the First Round of the CBI - his final game as a member of the Pride. Jenkins ended his career as Hofstra's all-time leading scorer with 2,513 points.
- On March 31, 2010, VCU became the first team in CBI history to win the Finals in two games, taking a 71-65 win at Saint Louis. The next season the Rams would become the first CBI champion to play in the NCAA Final Four.
- On April 3, 2009, Oregon State beat UTEP to capture its first-ever postseason championship as the Beavers earned the CBI title with an 81-73 win in El Paso.

In 2011, Creighton set a tournament record with a crowd of 12,381 in its Championship Series home game.

CBI PRIDE

The 2018 NCAA Tournament was a showcase for CBI success. In 2015, Loyola Chicago won the CBI in its first postseason appearance since 1985. In 2016, Nevada won the CBI. Both programs met in the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament last season with Loyola Chicago taking a 69-68 decision to advance to the Elite 8. The Ramblers followed that with a 78-62 win over Kansas State to advance to the Final Four. The Ramblers join VCU as a CBI champion (2010) that played in the Final Four (2011).

Brian Gregory, South Florida (2019)

We talk about building this thing. And you look at the other programs that have played in this tournament and what they've done after. We're trying to follow that same path.

The experience we're gaining from playing in this with a younger team, the extra practice time, and for our guys to realize the little things that you need to do to be successful in the postseason, is going to pay big dividends down the road for our program.

The CBI has been a great part of (our) growth. Looking at what happened with Nevada and the times they have been in it and other teams like Loyola, we look at it the same kind of way for our program and where we are right now and, most importantly, where we are going, it becomes really important and is a tremendous opportunity to have programmatic growth moving forward.

I felt the more games these guys play, the more they play together, the better they would get.

In some ways what (Bob Huggins) did for (WVU) might be better than even a one-and-done in either the NCAA or the NIT, for this late-blooming group had to have had its confidence shaken and ego crushed by being part of a...season with some really ugly performances.

Logan Simios, DePaul fan (The DePaulia 2019)

I have to tell you, as a longtime DePaul fan, I really enjoyed the CBI run and I went to every game. And again I felt that we could have on it all and won that last game [without the injuries to Eli Cain and Jaylen Butz] - but I think the run was kind of fun for DePaul fans. We haven't had any kind of a run for such a long time...it was fun and fans got into it.

The CBI was one of the best experiences I have ever had in basketball and to win a championship here - and we're about to cut down some nets - was better than I could have imagined.

For our team, obviously, it (playing in the CBI) is huge for us to get experience and to play in a significant games in a championship setting...I've coached in a lot of different tournaments and this has been an absolute blast and one of the best experiences I've had being part of a tournament because we get to do it at home. It's very rare you get that opportunity...To have the opportunity to win a championship in your own gym is unique and we're extremely blessed and grateful for the opportunity.

We started to play for each other and got good energy when we found out we were in.

Bryan Mauro, Fansided (2018)

North Texas gained some positive momentum going into the season this year. They were the winners of the CBI tournament. While the CBI is not the NCAA Tournament...it is still a great step in the right direction for a program like North Texas, who is trying to rebuild. The Mean Green also gained valuable tournament experience playing in the CBI. The tournament experience is going to help this team immensely once conference play starts.

Damien Sordellet, Lynchburg (Va.) News & Advance (2018)

Campbell coach Kevin McGeehan said he elected to participate in the CBI this season because of the tournament's track record. Two former CBI champions - Loyola-Chicago in 2015 and Nevada in 2016 - advanced to the second weekend of this season's NCAA Tournament. Loyola became the fourth No. 11 seed to reach the Final Four, and the Ramblers defeated the Wolf Pack in the Sweet 16.

David Grimes, Log Cabin Democrat (2018)

Monday was one of the most electric nights I've ever witnessed at the Farris Center... The men were selected to compete in the 16-team College Basketball Invitational... Four seasons ago, (Central Arkansas) won two games. This year, they tallied 18 victories and had the program's first winning record in over a decade. They absolutely earned and deserved this postseason trip.

Porter Moser, Loyola Chicago (2018)

(2015 CBI champions on building a winning culture heading into 2018 Final Four)
You know, like you know from being there in Chicago, it was a grass-roots rebuild. But the dynamics changed when you jump to the Missouri Valley, when we jumped. The first year we took a step back, and then that second year in the Valley, we won 24 games, and we won the CBI tournament. And we've just kind of been building and getting our arrow going up. And I think - I hope we're an example of, you know, it takes time. I get it. I've been there. Fans, administrations, they want it so fast, and it's tough.

Allen Edwards, Wyoming (2017)

These guys need more opportunities in postseason play to understand that it's a different mindset. It doesn't get to the point where it's another game. It's postseason. You're vying for a championship. Our guys need this experience to be better able to handle playing in postseason play.

Tom Burman, Wyoming athletic director (2017)

The CBI is a postseason opportunity for a young men's basketball team to gain additional competition and practice time. We are invested in helping our student-athletes improve, grow and reach their postseason goals.

Cliff Ellis, Coastal Carolina (2017)

What I like about (the CBI) for our program is the exposure. It's there. There's not going to be 64 teams playing in this tournament or that tournament. It's down to the championships and national television is going to be there. It's a week of basketball and we get to share that stage. I think that's huge.

Cliff Ellis, Coastal Carolina (2017)

Monday, Wednesday, Friday we're on ESPN. You cannot put a face value for what this win is worth for Coastal Carolina. You can't buy what is fixin' to happen next week.

It was the biggest night in our program's history. It was huge.

Jaylen Shaw, Coastal Carolina junior (2017)

Although it's not the NCAA Tournament, I'm just thankful to be playing in a tournament, personally. Just getting out there and being able to play against other teams, making myself better, getting the team ready for next year. We're trying to go out there and win every time, so we can't take it for granted. It's a tournament and we want to go out there and try to win it.

History shows success in the College Basketball Invitational can be a catalyst to more success in subsequent years...Virginia Commonwealth won the CBI title in 2010 and reached the Final Four in 2011. Nevada won the title last year and won the Mountain West Conference regular-season and tournament titles this season before losing to Iowa State in the opening round of the NCAA Tournament. Other examples include Fresno State winning in 2014 and reaching the NCAA tournament in 2016, and Oregon winning in coach Dana Altman's first season in 2011 and reaching the Sweet 16 two years later.

We're very fortunate to even be in this position we're in now... We're really thankful we were able to play in this postseason tournament so we're trying to make the most out of it each and every game.

This is just the best way to finish it out here at Nevada for me. I'm so happy. I can't even say.

The thing I will always remember about this is the celebration afterward and the smiles on the guys' faces.

Eric Musselman, Nevada (2016)

Before we even played a game in the CBI, what we did was we talked about what coach Rodney Terry had done with this Fresno State team (advancing to the 2014 CBI finals and winning the 2016 Mountain West Conference title). We used that to try to get our guys a little bit energized. Our players were disappointed that we weren't able to make the NCAA Tournament and then, realistically, we came up a little bit short, obviously, for the NIT... We had to get our guys motivated. We also talked about VCU propelling themselves into a Final Four after winning the CBI. So there are a lot of great examples for how teams can use this to kick start. Without a question, Fresno State and what Coach Terry has done is something that springboarded our attitudes going into this.

Marqueze Coleman, Nevada senior (2016)

It's an amazing feeling. It's been a long journey but it's also been a good one. I've been through so much adversity in my career and this teaches me that you can overcome adversity. You just have to stay strong and you can achieve great things. Winning this is going to be a lifelong memory for me.

Jack Rieger, Nevada Sagebrush (2016)

When the final whistle blew at 8:28 p.m., the Wolf Pack's players and coaches embraced one another and sprinted to the student section side of the court in pure elation. Elijah Foster, Cameron Oliver and others stood on the media table and opened their arms to the home fans, who had grown to adore their team with every passing week. First-year coach Eric Musselman was mobbed by the student section as chants of "Muss" echoed throughout Lawlor Events Center. The scene was taken directly from a Hollywood script, as players and coaches took their turn cutting down the nets.

Jack Rieger, Nevada Sagebrush (2016)

There's reason to believe winning the CBI could foreshadow bigger things. In 2010, VCU won the CBI and the next year was in the final four. In 2011, Oregon won the CBI and went 24-10 the following year in a really tough Pac-12 Conference. In 2012, Pittsburgh took home the CBI trophy and finished 2013 as the 20th-best team in the country.

Wes Miller, UNCG (2016)

This is our program's first taste of postseason basketball in a long time and we are still learning how to handle late game situations and the emotions that go with it in postseason play. This was a great experience for our guys and our program. This experience (CBI) will help our young team next year and beyond.

Jimmy Patsos, Siena (2016)

There's always going to be somebody on the other team who wants to play at this level and that's why the CBI is a great tournament. That's why some of those big schools who didn't come, I think some of them are making mistakes because some of them haven't been to the NCAA in 30 years. What do they think they are going to do, magic carpet ride it there?... You should go to the CBI and try to win a few games. And then maybe the NIT before you get fired. "But I just want to go to the NCAA or bust." I don't believe in that and I'm really appreciative to Siena and the CBI... But some of those big schools who didn't feel like playing, instead of whining and staying at home, come out and play basketball.

What a championship tournament atmosphere. I'm just tickled to death that our fans came out like they did and really got behind this team with great enthusiasm and geared us through. This was a total team effort by everybody from Morehead. It's just so refreshing to end the year at home with a win in this type of atmosphere here at Morehead State.

On hosting CBI games:

It's been beneficial on a number of levels. It's been good for the student-athlete to be able to stay at home, not have to travel, sleep in their own beds, go to class. From a fan's perspective, it's several more opportunities to see their team. On both levels, it's been a tremendous success.

R.J. White, UNCG junior (2016)

When Coach called, he asked if I had touched a basketball since spring break started. I lied and told him I did. I was just so excited to get another chance to play.

Cameron Dollar, Seattle (2016)

You wonder if you can match the experience that you had last year. The first time you do it is usually ... the experience that you're never able to duplicate. But it was a great experience. The crowd was great. The energy was great. I loved seeing the bounce in our kids' step and their eyes as they're playing. We couldn't even hear each other because of how loud it was.

Our kids have bought in (to the CBI). When was the last time you saw this gym this excited?

Brian Wickstrom, ULM athletic director (2015)

I was at UTEP and we played the first year (of the CBI) and lost. Then the second year we played in it and we made it to the championship against Oregon State. We had such a young team those two years. The next year we made the NCAA Tournament. With the team we have here, this is a great experience. All the extra practices and extra games our kids are getting to play, this is what this tournament is about. College basketball is an unbelievable experience for these kids and in an environment like this, it's outstanding.

Porter Moser, Loyola Chicago (2015)

Anytime you can keep playing, keep practicing in March, experience that "win or go home" feeling, it's a positive. I have not had that "Here we go again" feeling one time this season. These guys expect to win. That's another sign that the culture is changing.

Xavier Johnson, Colorado sophomore (2015)

I think it's fun. Anyone who wants to compete should be allowed to compete, and the harder they compete, the better it makes us.

Marty Wilson, Pepperdine (2015)

Our basketball team is thrilled to be competing in the CBI. It is an excellent and exciting opportunity for us to continue our season as we seek to build upon a positive basketball year.

Adam Hunsucker, The News Star (2015)

(Head coach Keith) Richard and the (ULM) Warhawks marched into the CBI following the program's best season since 2002 and rallied past Eastern Michigan 71-67 in the final minute... The win was ULM's first in the postseason since 1991... For one night, everyone inside Fant-Ewing Coliseum partied like it was the early 90s.

Patrick Chambers, Penn State (2014)

We are looking forward to the opportunity to play in the CBI. The team is grateful for [the] chance to continue practicing together and ultimately having a chance to compete for a championship.

Bob Grant, Wright State director of athletics (2013)

It's one of the best things we have ever done — absolutely. This was the crowning moment to a great season and a really great month for us. The buzz around us now is as much as the buzz was in 2007 when we made the NCAA tournament.

Steve Hawkins, Western Michigan (2013)

When you look at the field they put together for this thing (CBI), look at the teams that were in it and now out of it, the likes of Texas and Purdue, it is a very talented field and one that I thought compared favorably to the NIT, to be honest with you. To be sitting here in this situation is great for us. We're excited about it.

Rick Barnes, Texas (2013)

It may be different if we were a group of seniors and older guys. With a young group, you've gotta want to play. Every experience we could put these guys through, whether it's going on the road to play games ... we didn't do as well on the road as we have in the past.

Matt Painter, Purdue (2013)

I wanted to play. There wasn't much dialogue. I talked to our players, but you really want to play more games and get that bad taste out of your mouth. We played really well at the end of the season...

Terone Johnson, Purdue junior (2013)

We can use this tournament as a building block. For some teams that have played in the past, it definitely helped them. As young as we are, we can use it for a learning experience for next year.

Steve Pederson, Pittsburgh director of athletics (2012)

This was the right thing to do. Overall, it will be good competition for our players... There are a lot of advantages.

Jamie Dixon, Pittsburgh (2012)

It's great to finish out the [tournament with a victory]... The kids wanted to do more this year. They didn't feel they had done what they set out to do.

Tray Woodall, Pittsburgh junior (2012)

We looked at it like we wanted to keep getting better... We wanted to finish on a high note. We wanted to get guys experience. We have to keep working for next year, keep preparing for next year to become better players.

Nick Rivers, Pittsburgh senior (2012)

Anytime you end the year with a championship, it's a good thing. It shows you kept fighting until the end.

Brad Stevens, Butler (2012)

It was a great experience and a challenging event for our team. We are happy to have had the opportunity to play in the College Basketball Invitational.

Scott Nagy, South Dakota State (2012)

Obviously, you hope you make the NCAA Tournament, but if you don't, any tournament you can get into would be good. If you look at a school like VCU, two years ago it won the CBI and a year later it's in the Final Four. Any of those experiences can help. It's a huge benefit not only from the experience of being in a tournament, but you get to practice longer and you're practicing when other people aren't. For us, when we only have one senior, that's even more important.

Joevan Catron, Oregon senior (2011)

I think it's just great to play in the postseason, regardless of what tournament it is, just having a chance to play, taking advantage of it. Now we're down to no more chances to ever play in a Duck uniform.

Greg McDermott, Creighton (2011)

There's been a lot said about VCU and how it benefited them. Missouri State won a championship last year, and it benefited them this year. You're playing basketball when no one else is playing. You're practicing when no one else is practicing.

Greg McDermott, Creighton (2011)

Tomorrow it will be a month since we played in our conference tournament, so those four weeks for us, with extra practices and the six extra games, have been invaluable.

Antoine Young, Creighton junior (2011)

This tournament meant a lot to our team. We got some more experience. We took advantage of it, and we played really well.

John Denton, *Knights Insider* (2011)

(UCF head coach) Donnie Jones knows there will come a time next season when he'll point back to something from Wednesday's win against St. Bonaventure - the way UCF defended in the 2-3 zone or the way the Knights attacked offensively with their drive-and-kick game - and realize the direct benefits of playing in the postseason.

Gary Horowitz, *Statesman Journal* (2011)

The national title game was a dud, but at least I got to enjoy the College Basketball Invitational final - Oregon's dramatic 71-69 victory against Creighton.

Shaka Smart, VCU (2010)

(On using the CBI experience as a springboard to NCAA Tournament success)
It's huge, really big for us... Obviously, in the postseason, this group that we've had the last two years, if you add it up, we're (10-0) right now in the postseason.

Shaka Smart, VCU (2010)

(On winning the 2010 CBI and advancing to the 2011 Final Four)
We were still getting to know each other. When we played in (the CBI), it gave us a phenomenal opportunity to continue building and learning and playing a lot of our young guys.

Shaka Smart, VCU (2010)

There's a perception that tournament is not where you want to be, you want to be in the NCAA Tournament, but it was a chance to keep gaining experience. The biggest thing is we were able to go from there and have a successful year.

Jamie Skeen, VCU junior (2010)

(After winning the 2010 CBI (VCU advanced to the 2011 Final Four)
It's a momentum builder going into next year. We're losing some seniors, but it's going to give us confidence for next year. We went out this season with a bang.

Ron Hunter, IUPUI (2010)

Our guys deserve this. We absolutely deserve to be playing postseason basketball and being a part of March Madness. We were obviously disappointed that we didn't win our conference tournament, but we still wanted to be part of postseason basketball... this gives us another chance to showcase our basketball program on a larger stage.

Tim Miles, Colorado State (2010)

We're so happy the season didn't end with the San Diego State game. A lot of people go to a lot of places for spring break and we're happy to be going to Morehead State.

El Paso (Texas) Times (2009)

The crowd was alive... some sort of living, breathing entity with ear shattering, rock concert, airplane noise. It began to grow as it formed at 3 p.m. to await the chance to get into the building. It flowed down the concourse, filling up the seats like lava flowing out of a volcano. It rocked and rolled and roared.

Craig Robinson, Oregon State (2009)

First of all, it gives us some experience playing in the postseason. Secondly, it allows us to keep playing. We are one of the few teams still playing and that is terrific for the program... it is terrific for our confidence... it is a terrific overall experience. And finally, we have access to our players on a full-time basis right now which helps with player development, strategies for next year and builds our confidence level heading into the spring, when we need that extra work. This is a wonderful tournament and great opportunity for our program.

Craig Robinson, Oregon State (2009)

What is comical to me is, I think that most of the people out there thought we shouldn't do this. And I do not care about that. I wanted to play more games and I'm happy that we did. This is a terrifically run tournament and we've played good basketball. We've gotten so many good things out of this.

Norm Roberts, *St. John's* (2009)

We see it as all good. It's an opportunity for our guys to play in a tournament atmosphere. It's a chance to win a title. It's a way to keep playing and a young team like ours can really benefit from that.

Benji Harris, *Sam Page Sports* (2008)

The championship is a best of three series. I repeat a best of three series! This is one of the best things I have ever heard of. This is how championships are won in the NBA and I love the idea of a championship series in college hoops. This allows for these games to actually feel like basketball games. Student sections, pep bands, and elderly boosters screaming their lungs out are all things that are lost in the NCAA championship but not in the CBI championship.

COLLEGE BASKETBALL INVITATIONAL

Army West Point Black Knights (Head Coach: Jimmy Allen, Patriot League)

Army West Point reaches postseason play in 2020-2021 for the first time since 2016, finishing the regular season with a record of 12-9 and reaching the Patriot League Tournament Semifinal for the first time since 2016. The Black Knights finished fourth with a record of 7-7 in Patriot League play, securing a home game in the quarterfinals of the Patriot League Tournament, marking the first time in school history that Army has hosted back-to-back quarterfinal contests at home in Christl Arena. The Black Knights feature a trio of guards who earned All-Patriot League honors, led by the league's defensive Player of the Year, junior Josh Caldwell. Caldwell was also named to the team's All-Defensive Team. Senior guard Lonnie Grayson was named to the All-Patriot League Second Team, while freshman Jalen Rucker was named to the All-Rookie Team. The Black Knights come to Daytona Beach as the owners of three NET Top 100 wins with victories over Buffalo, Patriot League Tournament Champion Colgate and Academy rival Navy.



Bellarmine Knights (Head Coach: Scott Davenport, ASUN Conference)

The Bellarmine Knights are in the first year of their transition to NCAA Division I as members of the ASUN Conference. Bellarmine's inaugural game in DI was at Duke University in Cameron Indoor Stadium. The Knights lost that initial contest, but got their first DI win in their next outing at Howard. Bellarmine opened conference play against Lipscomb and dropped back-to-back games to the Bisons. However, Bellarmine then reeled off 10 straight ASUN victories before falling to Liberty on the last day of the regular season. The Knights' top players are juniors Pedro Bradshaw and Dylan Penn, who both earned 1st Team All-ASUN accolades. Bellarmine is led by Coach Scott Davenport, who is nominated by College Insider for the Jim Phelan Coach of the Year (DI National Coach of the Year) and the Hugh Durham Coach of the Year (Mid-Major Coach of the Year). In Division II, the Knights captured the 2011 National Championship and made additional final four appearances in 2012, 2015, and 2017. Davenport was named DII National Coach of the Year by NABC in 2011. He is the all-time winningest coach at Bellarmine with a record of 377-16.



Bowling Green Falcons (Head Coach: Michael Huger, Mid-American Conference)

Bowling Green went 14-11 on the season and played in the MAC Tournament quarterfinals. Head Coach Michael Huger led the Falcons to a 10-8 record in conference play. The Falcons have now won 10-plus league games in three-straight years for just the third time in school history. The Falcons are led by a trio of seniors in 2020-21, including guard Justin Tuner, who became Bowling Green's all-time leading scorer this season and currently ranks 10th in MAC history with 2,077 career points. Forward Daegwon Plowden was named Third Team All-MAC in 2020-21, and ranks 10th in school history in both career rebounds (719) and blocked shots (89). Plowden ranks 38th on BGSU's all-time scoring list with 1,124 points. Fellow senior Trey Diggs was named the MAC's Sixth Man of the Year in 2020-21. Diggs, who averaged 11.4 points as a senior, has knocked down 106 three-pointers since becoming a Falcon in 2019.



Bryant Bulldogs (Head Coach: Jared Grasso, Northeast Conference)

It has been a historic year for Bryant as the Bulldogs hosted both the Northeast Conference semifinal and championship game for the first time in program history. The Bulldogs won their semifinal matchup by 30 points, advancing to the NEC Championship game for the first time in program history. Bryant features five players that average double-figure scoring, including All-NEC selections Peter Kiss and Michael Green III. Charles Pride is fresh off a career-high 33-point performance in the NEC title game. Jared Grasso, a finalist for the 2021 Hugh Durham Award, is in his third season with the Bulldogs. Grasso took over a team that was 3-28 the year before he arrived and has posted a 40-43 record. That includes a 30-23 record over the last two seasons. Bryant will be playing in the CBI for the second time in program history. The Bulldogs hosted Richmond in the first round of the 2013 CBI, falling 76-71.



Coastal Carolina Chanticleers (Head Coach: Cliff Ellis, Sun Belt Conference)

Coastal Carolina finished the season with a 16-7 record and went 9-5 in the Sun Belt Conference finishing second in the East Division. The Chants then made a run to the semifinals of the Sun Belt Conference Championship before falling in overtime to eventual tournament champion Appalachian State. The Chants are led by Mr. Everything DeVante' Jones, who was named the Sun Belt Conference Player of the Year. He was listed among the league leaders in nine different categories and even added four double-doubles while playing as an off-guard. Head coach Cliff Ellis is closing in on his 800th NCAA Division I career win. He enters the Invite with 796 wins as a NCAA D-I coach and has 874 wins as a collegiate head coach. He is ranked among the top-10 in both categories and is also the lone coach to win 170 or more games at four different programs and is one of three head coaches to be named a Conference Coach of the Year at four schools. Freshman post player Essam Mostafa had seven double-doubles on the season and averaged over 11 points and nine rebounds per outing. Sophomore Ebrima Dibba led the league in assists with 5.3 per game and has 121 assists even though he is not the team's point guard. The Chants did have two other players averaging in double-figures with Deanthony Tipler averaging 14.5 coming off the bench and starting point guard Tyrik Dixon averaging 11 points per game.



Longwood Lancers (Head Coach: Griff Aldrich, Big South Conference)

Longwood enters the College Basketball Invitational on the strength of a record-breaking 2020-21 season under third-year head coach Griff Aldrich. The Lancers amassed the most Big South wins in school history, won nine of their final 12 games, and advanced to the semifinals of the Big South Championship. Led by the backcourt trio of All-Big South point guard Juan Munoz, Big South All-Freshman Team honoree Justin Hill, and team captain DeShaun Wade, Longwood is armed with the Big South's top scoring defense, holding opponents to a league-low 64.3 points per game in conference play. Munoz leads the team with 12.7 points per game, followed by Wade's 11.5 and Hill's 11.0. The CBI appearance will be Longwood's second, after last advancing to the tournament in 2019, and the program's second postseason trip in three years under Aldrich. The Lancers' last trip to the CBI saw them take down Southern Miss 90-66 in the opening round to move on to the quarterfinals.



Pepperdine Waves (Head Coach: Lorenzo Romar, West Coast Conference)

Pepperdine returns to the CBI for the third time (2015, 2016). It's a chance for senior guard Colbey Ross, a three-time All-WCC first team pick, to play in the postseason for the first time while extending one of the more prolific careers in college basketball history. Ross needs just one point to become the first Division I men's player ever to amass career totals of at least 2,200 points, 800 assists and 400 rebounds. On the WCC's all-time lists, he ranks second in assists (826) and sixth in points (2,199). Ross is averaging 18.2 points this season and ranks third nationally at 7.5 assists. He and junior forward Kessler Edwards (16.9 points, 6.9 rebounds) make a formidable 1-2 punch. The duo was both named to the All-WCC first team (the Waves and #1 Gonzaga were the only schools to put multiple players on the first team). Pepperdine was seeded third in the WCC Tournament, its best seeding since 2004, behind eventual NCAA Tournament teams Gonzaga and BYU. Lorenzo Romar, in his third year back as head coach of the Waves, will coach in the CBI for the second time.



Stetson Hatters Head Coach: Donnie Jones, ASUN Conference)

Despite regularly fielding a starting lineup featuring two sophomores and two freshmen, Stetson reached the postseason for the first time in the program's Division I history (1972-present). Stetson's leading scorers are sophomore Rob Perry (14.3) and freshman Chase Johnston (14.1). Johnston is the ASUN Conference Freshman of the Year and was selected to the Kyle Macy Freshman All-America Team. Johnston enters the CBI having made a Stetson record 78 3-pointers this season. The Hatters were the only ASUN program to play all 16 games this season. Stetson's best wins this season are against Liberty (at home) and Bellarmine ASUN Tournament). Head coach Donnie Jones is in his second season with Stetson after stints at Marshall (2007-10) and UCF (2010-16). For Jones, this is his fourth trip to the postseason and second invitation to the CBI (2011; reached semifinals). Jones-coached teams also played in the CIT (2010) and NIT (2012).

Did You Know...

In 2019, DePaul's Max Strus became the first player in CBI history to score more than 30 points three times. He netted 33 points in the Blue Demons' First Round win over Central Michigan, 38 points in a Quarterfinal win over Longwood, and 32 points in a Game 2 Finals win over South Florida. His 160 points set a CBI scoring record and places him behind Glen Rice 184 (1989 NCAA), Bill Bradley 177 (1965 NCAA), Elvin Hayes 167 (1968 NCAA), Danny Manning 163 (1988 NCAA), and tied with Jerry West (1959 NCAA) and Hal Lear (1956 NCAA) for the most points ever scored in a postseason tournament.

In 2019, DePaul became the first team in CBI history to score 100 points twice. The Blue Demons opened play with a 100-86 win over Central Michigan and then downed South Florida, 100-96 in overtime, in Game 2 of the Finals.

Did You Know...

Everything went in the basketball when Duquesne hosted Omaha in the First Round of the 2016 CBI. The two teams combined for a record 232 points as the Dukes pulled away with a 120-112 win in a game that did not go into overtime. The 120 points scored by Duquesne and the 112 by Omaha are the two highest single-game outputs in CBI history. The two teams also combined for a record 149 second half points with the Mavericks setting the team record with 80 points. Duquesne's 69 second half points are the second-most in CBI history.
